What is Dual Enrollment?

Dual Enrollment is a **special admissions program.**

It allows students to take classes at CSM and earn college credit while still in high school, and in some cases, these classes can count simultaneously as high school credit.

Public, private, and homeschool students are eligible to apply.



What are the benefits of Dual Enrollment?

- > Earn transferrable college credit while still in high school.
- > Begin completing college degree requirements early.
- > Experience the rigor of a college course.
- > Receive the benefits of being a CSM student including free tutoring, library resources, and more.
- > CCPS students taking courses from an approved list will have tuition paid by CCPS.
- > Eligible Non-CCPS students receive a 25% tuition discount.



AP vs Dual Enrollment

AP Classes

AP courses and Dual Enrollment are not the same.

Dual Enrollment



AP classes and exams are facilitated by the College Board.

AP classes are offered exclusively through the high schools.

College credit may be earned by passing an end-of-year exam.

Every college/university has their own policy towards accepting AP credit.

Dual Enrollment is offered in direct partnership between CCPS and CSM

DE options are available in the high school and at CSM directly.

College credit is earned through successful completion of the course.

DE credits can be evaluated for transfer at other colleges/universities.



The decision of whether to take an AP or Dual Enrollment course should be made on a case-by-case basis.

Your high school counselor is a great resource when making this decision.



Dual Enrollment Options

1. Dual Enrollment on a CSM Campus or Online

Open to:

Public, Private, Home School Juniors and Seniors

Admissions steps and eligibility requirements can vary depending on which of the above categories a student fits into.

2. Dual Enrollment In the High School

Open to:

Public School Students who are taking eligible courses in their high school.

Opportunities include:

- Dual English
- Dual Math
- Dual Kinesiology
- Dual Digital Media Production
- Dual Biology/PLTW-Biomedical
- Dual Criminal Justice



Dual Enrollment on a CSM Campus or Online: Private or Homeschool

General Eligibility Requirements:

Students must be a high school junior or senior.

Students must identify what private school or homeschool program they report to, and have this information be verified by CSM.

Homeschool students must report their progress to a local Board of Education or to a MSDE Approved umbrella organization to receive the Dual Enrollment Discount.

Students must **demonstrate college readiness** either through placement testing or submitting qualifying SAT/ACT scores.

College Readiness Requirement

Students must place at the college level on the CSM reading and writing placement assessments (and the math placement assessment if needed)

OR

Student may place by submitting qualifying SAT/ACT scores:

SAT

- 480+ on the Evidence-Based Reading and Writing section
- 570+ or higher on Math

ACT

- 21+ on English and Reading
- 24+ on Math

Demonstrate College Readiness

Students can demonstrate readiness by submitting qualifying ACT/SAT scores, or by successfully completing CSM Placement Testing.

After fully completing the previous steps, Students will be contacted by an Enrollment Coordinator to complete course registration.

Dual Enrollment: CCPS Requirements

- 1. The student must be a junior or senior in high school.
- 2. Juniors must be enrolled in high school full-time (7 classes).
- 3. Seniors must be enrolled in at least one course with CCPS (the course must be one credit (or (2) .5 credit courses) or greater).
- 4. Senior students must be enrolled in a minimum of four courses between CCPS and CSM in the Fall semester. The specific courses must be from the approved list of course.
- 5. The student must be enrolled in at least one course with CSM.
- 6. The student must have a unweighted cumulative GPA of 2.75 or greater on a 4.0 scale.
- 7. The student must have met all MCAP requirements for graduation.
- 8. The student must have completed all service-learning hours required for graduation.
- 9. The agreement must be signed by the principal/designee prior to enrollment.

CCPS Grading Procedures 3415.3

- ❖ Provides specific information about how grades are recorded on high school transcript
- ❖ All courses on the approved list will appear on the high school transcript if taken during fall or spring semester
- ❖ Students must request pre-approval from the principal for any courses on the approved list to appear on the transcript for summer classes. This is usually only approved when the course is needed for graduation.
- ❖ All courses on the approved list will be calculated into the student's GPA and rank
- College courses are not used for honor roll or athletic eligibility

Dual Enrollment In the High Schools

CCPS students can earn college credits for eligible courses taken <u>directly in their Public High School</u>. Students taking eligible classes can sign up for the Dual Enrollment option during the school year.

For these opportunities:

No placement testing is required

Any grade level may participate

Students may receive both high school and college credit if they opt-in The final high school course and college grades may be different

All coursework is done exclusively at the high school



Dual Enrollment In the High Schools

To Participate, Students Must:

Meet any eligibility criteria for enrollment in the specific subject available for dual credit Submit all applications, forms, and paperwork to CSM by the established deadline



Dual Enrollment In the High Schools

Specific registration instructions will be distributed to students through their high school classes.

Students must actively complete the registration steps to receive credit.

Please note: Students are not automatically registered to participate in Dual Enrollment

Students **must** complete the registration steps to participate.

Dual English

Students taking **Composition and Rhetoric** in their high school can earn credit for CSM's **ENG-1010** course.

To be eligible, students must receive a C or higher on their portfolio review assessed at the end of the second quarter. Their high school English teacher will let them know if they've met the criteria.

The final CSM ENG-1010 grade is calculated by compiling only the grades on the essays students complete in class.

This means the final grade for high school and college may be different.



ENG-1010 can fulfill first-year English course requirements for most programs at the college level.

Dual English

Students taking **Composition and Literature** in their high school can earn credit for CSM's **ENG-1020** course.

To be eligible, students must receive credit for ENG-1010 through CSM, from one of the following options:

- Earned a 70% or better in the dual-in-school ENG-1010 option previous school year.
- Credit through CSM for AP English Language exam score of 3, 4 or 5.
- Credit through ENG-1010 taken directly at CSM

The final CSM ENG-1020 grade is calculated by the product grades on assignments throughout the school year.



ENG-1020 can fulfill second-year English course requirements for most programs at the college level.

Students taking the following high school courses can earn credit for CSM's **MTH-1150** course:

- ***** Honors Pre-Calculus
- **❖** Accelerated Algebra 2 with Pre-Calculus

The final CSM MTH-1150 grade is comprised of:

- **75%** The coursework done throughout the course
- 25% A CSM final exam

The high school grade and the college grade may be different.

CSM's grading scale for STEM courses is:

A= 90-100%

B = 80-89.9%

C = 70-79.9%

D= 65-69.9%

F = 0-64.9%



MTH-1150 can fulfill many firstyear Math course requirements at the college level and can satisfy pre-requisite requirements for higher level math classes.

Dual Kinesiology

Students taking the Physical Rehabilitation course through their high school can earn credit for CSM's **WFS-2000** course.

The CSM final grade will be comprised of 20% of class assignments, 80% of demonstration of content mastery, including a final exam developed by CSM.



WFS-2000 can be applied towards a degree in Exercise and Sport Science at CSM or be used as an elective for other programs.

Dual Digital Media Production

Students taking the Interactive Media Production course can earn credit for CSM's **DMP-1010** course.

The Final CSM grade consists of:

- 60% Three course projects
- 30% High school coursework
- 10% Final exam

The high school and CSM final grades may be different.



DMP-1010 can be applied towards a degree in Digital Media Production at CSM or as an elective credit for many other programs at CSM.

Dual Biology/ PLTW-Biomedical

High School seniors who complete the PLTW-Biomedical program sequence in high school can earn credit for CSM's

BIO-1040 and BIO-1040L courses.

Students must have earned a B or higher in their four Biomedical classes and have passed all the exams with high rankings to be eligible.



BIO-1040/L can be used to satisfy a Biological/Physical Sciences requirement for many programs at CSM or can be used as an elective.

Multiple Criminal Justice courses offer an option for Dual Enrollment Credit.

High School Course	CSM Equivalent
American Criminal Justice System	CJS-1015: Introduction to Criminal Justice
Criminal Law	CJS-2030: Criminal Law
Juvenile Justice	CJS-2040: Juvenile Delinquency
Criminal Investigation	CJS-1060: Introduction to Criminal Investigation

To be eligible, students must have a grade of "C" or higher in their course.

The Final CSM grade consists of: **80%** - High school coursework

20% - A CSM Final Exam



These credits can be applied towards Criminal Justice programs at CSM or can be used as electives for many other programs.



What Can a Student Do With the Credits They Earn? Students can continue their

Students can continue their studies at CSM after high school to earn a Letter of Recognition, Certificate, or Associate Degree.

Students can transfer credits directly to a 4-year institution after high school (or transfer after earning a degree at CSM).



How Do Credits Transfer?

By participating in Dual Enrollment, you create a college transcript at CSM.

Your CSM transcript records your course attempts and your final course grades. When you attend another institution, you can send a copy of your CSM transcript to your school of choice for evaluation.

Most credits earned through CSM will transfer to four-year colleges and universities within the state of Maryland.

You are encouraged to contact your school of choice to verify that your credits will transfer.

Career & Technology Education

(CTE)











The CTE Program

Career & Technology Education (CTE) is a program that allows students to earn articulated college credits through a sequence of academic and technical coursework in the high school.

- ❖ Students who successfully complete accepted CTE programs through their high school may receive articulated credit at CSM at no cost to.
- ❖ These articulated credits can be applied at CSM towards specifically designated letters of recognition, certificates, and Associate of Applied Science (AAS) degrees.
- ❖ CTE articulated credits generally do not apply to programs outside of CSM.
- ❖ CTE is *not* dual enrollment, but CTE program students *can* also take classes through CSM's Dual Enrollment program.



What do High School students need to do to be a CTE candidate?

- Start asking your high school counselor questions about CTE in the ninth grade and explore technical program(s) you find interesting. You may begin CTE courses as early as your sophomore year (exceptions may apply).
- Work with your high school counselor to register for the required high school courses.
- Complete all courses in the program with a grade of 'B' or better in each course.
- Apply to CSM during senior year of high school, select a designated program, and complete a transcript evaluation request.
- Request articulation of credits within two years of high school graduation to CSM.

Gifted & Talented Program

Requirements

- ➤ Must have completed 7th grade but not yet eligible for admission to the Dual Enrollment Program.
- ➤ Must apply to CSM and submit a Gifted & Talented Form with a recommendation from a **non-family member** (teacher, counselor, etc,)
- ➤ Must demonstrate the ability to benefit from college instruction by either:
 - *Testing at the college level in English and Reading on the CSM placement assessments,
 - ❖ Submitting qualifying SAT/ACT scores

Gifted & Talented students do not receive a tuition discount.



Let's Talk Numbers

CCPS students taking courses from the CCPS Approved List, or courses offered in the high school, will have the cost of the course covered entirely by CCPS. This includes tuition, fees, and textbooks. (Only 4 courses are covered per academic year, and classes are only covered for Fall and Spring semesters)

Private/Homeschooled students who meet all eligibility requirements receive a 25% tuition discount. (Students pay 75% of tuition and 100% of fees. Course fees and textbooks will be extra.)

CCPS students taking non-approved courses also receive the 25% tuition discount.

2025 Fall Semester tuition discount example:

SOC-1010 (3 Credits)

Regular Cost = **\$525.00** (\$420 tuition + \$105.00 fee)

Dual Student Price = \$420.00 (\$315.00 tuition + \$105.00 fee)

*Additional course fees and books will be extra.





What is FERPA?

- FERPA is the **Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act**, a Federal law enacted in 1974.
- As a college student, your records and your grades are yours alone.
- FERPA mandates that all college academic records may not be shared with third parties, including parents. This applies to Dual Enrollment students, regardless of age.
- > Students must have written permission on file with CSM for disclosure of grades and other information to third parties.



Participation in the Dual Enrollment program requires the exchange of information between CCPS and CSM. This information may include, but is not limited to: grades, 504/IEP accommodations, eligibility for Free and Reduced Meals, and student status in course(s). When you participate in Dual Enrollment, you give CCPS and CSM permission to exchange information to meet requirements of the program.

Procedures for Requesting Disability Support Services

- Disability Support Services are **voluntary**
- IEP/504 Plan is *not* automatically submitted to college
- Contact DSS office
- Interactive Intake meeting with DSS staff
- Provide **recent documentation**(3 years) of disability
- An IEP, 504 Plan, or Exit Document is generally not sufficient documentation
- Accommodation plan provided to student
- Student discusses accommodation plan with instructor

All applications, placement, and Dual Enrollment paperwork/forms must be arranged, completed, and submitted **prior** to the posted deadlines



Dual Enrollment *at* CSM:

Dual Enrollment in the High School:
