

What is Dual Enrollment?

- Dual Enrollment is a special admissions program that allows students to take classes at CSM for college credit while in high school.
- Public, private, and home school students are eligible to apply.
- Some classes to count simultaneously as high school credit.







What are the benefits of Dual Enrollment?

- Earn transferrable college credit.
- Be closer to earning your college degree.
- Experience the rigor of a college course.
- Satisfy prerequisites for higher-level college courses.
- Receive the benefits of being a CSM student including free tutoring, library resources, and more.
- Save money with a 50% tuition discount.







AP vs. Dual Enrollment



- AP Classes and Dual Enrollment are <u>not</u> the same.
 - AP classes and exams are facilitated by the College Board. Students who want to receive college credits through AP will take this course all year in their high school and then sit for the College Board AP exam in May. If they receive a high enough score, they may earn college credits.
 - Dual Enrollment is offered in direct partnership between CCPS and CSM. Dual Enrollment courses
 directly award students college credits if they have a passing grade in the course.
- AP Classes are <u>not</u> eligible for Dual Enrollment credit.
- The decision of whether to take AP or Dual Enrollment courses should be made on a case-by-case basis.
 - Your high school counselor in the high school is a great resource for help in making this decision.
 - College websites are also a good indication of what is anticipated to be transferrable for AP or
 Dual Enrollment credits. You should look at specific program requirements and what is accepted
 at your colleges of interest.

Gifted & Talented

Requirements

- Must have completed 7th grade but be under 16 years old
- Must be able to benefit from college instruction by testing at the college level in English and Reading and mathematics on the CSM placement assessments OR by submitting qualifying SAT/ACT scores
- Must submit a Gifted & Talented Recommendation Form from a non-family member (teacher, counselor, etc. is acceptable) in addition to other admissions items

Gifted & Talented students are not eligible for the 50% tuition discount







Dual at CSM – Private or Home School

General Information

- Students must be at least 16 years old.
- Students must receive verification of annual home school review from the party indicated on the Dual Enrollment form:
 - Third-party signature from a coordinator of a home or private school program:
 - CSM verifies student's enrollment with umbrella organization or private school counselor.

OR

- CSM verifies student's registration with the county Board of Education.
- Home/private school students may receive a tuition discount if they report to the Board of Education or an MSDE approved umbrella organization and if they place at the college level in reading and English.
- Students must demonstrate college readiness either through placement testing or submitting qualifying SAT/ACT scores as follows:

College Readiness Requirements

- Check college readiness with one of these options:
 - Placing at the college-level on the CSM reading and writing placement assessments and taking math placement testing if needed OR
 - Submitting qualifying SAT/ACT scores:
 - SAT 480 or higher on the Evidence-based Reading and Writing section and a 570 or higher on math
 - ACT 21 or higher on English and Reading and 24 or higher on math

Dual at CSM – Public School

General Requirements

- Students must have completed 10th grade
- Students must complete all paperwork, forms, and enrollment steps by the deadline.
- Students must meet all yearly assessments, service learning requirements, etc., as determined by the high school.
- Students must enroll in courses from the approved list from the high school.
- Juniors must be enrolled full time at the high school, while seniors may get early release to come to CSM to take classes on campus (public school).
- Students must meet college readiness requirements as follows.

College Readiness Requirements

- Check college readiness with one of these options:
 - A high school cumulative, unweighted GPA of 2.75 or higher as shown on the high school transcript

OR

- A high school cumulative, unweighted GPA of 2.5 or higher AND qualifying SAT/ACT scores:
 - SAT 480 or higher on the Evidence-based Reading and Writing section and a 570 or higher on math
 - ACT 21 or higher on English and reading and 24 or higher on math





How to Get Started with Dual at CSM

- Meet with your high school counselor to discuss your Dual Enrollment options.
- Complete the online CSM Dual Enrollment admissions application: www.csmd.edu/apply-register.
 - Include your Social Security Number.
- Complete the electronic Dual Enrollment form with your parent/guardian at www.csmd.edu/dualenrollment. Attach a copy of your transcript (and SAT/ACT scores if you have them).
 - Contact your Enrollment Coordinator to discuss placement testing if you are applying for Gifted & Talent or as a home/private school student.

- Your Enrollment Coordinator will send your Dual Enrollment form to your high school counselor and principal (or umbrella organization) for their signatures. When your Enrollment Coordinator receives their approval, they will contact you to schedule a registration appointment.
- Complete registration with your Enrollment Coordinator and make payment arrangements.



Students can take a variety of core and elective courses from many different subject areas.

Examples include:

- Arts
- Biological Sciences
- English Composition
- Humanities
 - Communications
 - Spanish
 - History
 - Philosophy

- Mathematics
- Physical Sciences
- Social/Behavioral Sciences:
 - Economics
 - Geography
 - Government
 - Psychology and Sociology

Dual in the High Schools

For the following five Dual Enrollment options, students may complete coursework <u>directly in their high school and opt-in</u> to earn dual college credit mid-school year. For these opportunities:

- No placement testing is required
- Any grade level may participate per appropriate placement in the high school
- Students may receive both high school and college credit if they opt-in
- The high school and college grades may be different

To opt-in, students must:

- Meet any eligibility criteria for enrollment in the specific subject available for dual credit
- Submit all applications, forms, and paperwork to CSM by the deadline
- Set up a student account and make payment for the credits after receiving registration confirmation via email

Separate registration forms will be provided in the high school classes. Students must complete the steps to enrollment listed on the form to receive the dual credit. Please see the form for the dual course deadline.





Dual Math in the High School

At the end of the school year, students will take a CSM final exam. The final grade students receive on their CSM transcript will be 75% based on the grades on high school coursework and 25% based on the grade on the CSM final exam. The grading scale for the STEM course is:

A= 90-100% B= 80-89.9% C= 70-79.9% D= 65-69.9% F= 0-64.9%

- Earning college-level credit for math while in high school can help students satisfy math or general requirements for college and can help your student get ahead on a math sequence they may need for their future college major.
 - MTH-1010 non-STEM
 - MTH-1120 and MTH-1150 STEM

Students taking select math courses in the high school may complete the steps to earn college credit at the same time.

- Intro to Advanced Math = MTH-1010
 (Quantitative Literacy & Reasoning 3 credits)
- Advanced Algebra w/ Trig = MTH-1120
 (College Algebra 3 credits)
- Pre-calculus—Honors = MTH-1150 (Pre-calculus – 4 credits)





Dual English in the High School

- Seniors are eligible to take this English course in the high school.
- Requirements to be eligible to earn dual credit include demonstrating college readiness at the discretion of the CCPS English teacher and receiving a C or better on their portfolio reviews as assessed at the end of 2nd quarter. Students who meet the criteria will receive the registration form from their high school English teacher.
- This course will fulfill many first-year/semester English course requirements at the college level.

Seniors taking Honors Composition & Rhetoric in the high school can earn equivalent college credit for ENG-1010 (Composition & Rhetoric – 3 credits) through CSM.





Dual Anatomy & Physiology in the High School (North Point)

- At the end of the school year, students will take a CSM final exam. The final grade students receive on their CSM transcript will be 75% based on the grades on high school coursework and 25% based on the grade on the CSM final exam.
- These credits can fulfill requirements for general education degree programs that require an unspecified general education science course or serve as a general elective in many programs.

Students taking Honors Anatomy & Physiology at North Point High School can earn credit for BIO-1040 and BIO-1040L (Intro to Human Anatomy & Physiology w/ Lab – 4 credits total).





Dual Digital Media Production in the High School

- Students will be offered to opt-in during their final year in the program at Stethem.
- The high school and CSM final grades may be different. The CSM grade will consist of three projects (60% of the CSM grade), high school coursework (30% of the CSM grade), and a final exam (10% of the CSM grade).
- These credits can be applied to a future degree in Digital Media Production at CSM, as an elective, or an elective at another university.

Students taking Interactive Media
Production at Robert D. Stethem
Educational Center can earn credit for
DMP-1010 (Digital Media Production
– 3 credits) through CSM.





Dual Biology/PLTW-Biomedical in the High School

- Seniors are eligible to earn the credit at the end of the PLTW sequence in the high school.
- Students' eligibility is based on GPA, yearly PLTW course exams, and other qualifications.
 See form for more details.
- These credits can fulfill requirements for general education degree programs that require an unspecified general education science course or serve as a general elective in many programs.

Students completing the Project Lead the Way (PLTW)—Biomedical program in the high school can earn credit at the end of the PLTW program for BIO-1040 and BIO-1040L (Intro to Human Anatomy & Physiology w/ Lab- 4 credits total) through CSM.







Pilot Program 2022-23

- Early College is currently in our pilot program for the 2022-23 academic year with a cohort of 65 seniors.
- This leads to a 34 credit certificate program that allows students to complete transferable credits and their high school diploma at the same time.
- Students must meet a separate set of eligibility requirements and complete the application and specific Early College Request Form by a determined deadline.

- For the 2023-2024 school year the program is expanding to all 7 high schools in the county and will be open to both juniors and seniors.

What can a student do with the credits they earn?

Continue studies at CSM after high school to earn a letter of recognition, certificate, or associate degree.



Transfer credits directly to a 4-year institution after high school (or transfer after earning a degree at CSM).





How Do Courses Transfer?

- Courses that are completed will show on your CSM transcript along with the college grade earned.
- If you are planning to begin your educational journey at a four-year institution, you can request for a copy of your official transcript to be sent directly to the institution of your choice. (Be sure to save your course syllabi.)
- Credits taken through CSM can transfer to a four-year universities within the state of Maryland and out of state and to public and private institutions.
- We encourage all students to contact their school of choice to verify that their CSM credits will transfer.

Career & Technology Education

(CTE)











The CTE Program

- Students who successfully complete accepted CTE programs and meet the criteria for articulation may receive articulated credit at CSM at no cost to them <u>after</u> graduating from high school.
- These articulated credits can be applied at CSM to designated letters of recognition, certificates, and associate of applied science (AAS) degrees, with the exception of the Teacher Academy of Maryland (TAM).
- CTE articulated credits generally do <u>not</u> apply to programs outside of CSM.
 - TAM is the exception if students complete an AAT at CSM before transferring.
- CTE is <u>not</u> Dual Enrollment, but at the discretion of CCPS, students may combine CTE with CSM's Dual Enrollment program to get ahead and save money.

Career & Technology Education (CTE) is a program that allows students to earn articulated college credits through a sequence of academic and technical coursework in the high school.

What do high school students need to do to be a CTE candidate?

- Start asking questions about CTE in the ninth grade and explore technical program(s) you find interesting. You may begin CTE courses as early as your sophomore year (exceptions may apply).
- Work with your high school counselor to register for the required high school courses.
- Complete all courses in the program with a grade of 'B' or better in each course.
- Apply to CSM at the completion of the CTE course sequence, request an official transcript be sent to CSM, and complete a CTE evaluation request form at www.csmd.edu/cte. Select "View Charles County Programs."
- Request articulation of credits <u>within two years</u> of your high school graduation date.



Let's talk numbers.

- Dual Enrollment students in Charles County who meet all eligibility requirements receive a 50% tuition discount. (Students pay 50% of tuition and 100% of fees. Course fees and textbooks will be extra.)
- 2022 Fall tuition example:

PSY-1010 (3 Credits)

Regular Cost = \$513.75

Dual Student Price = \$308.25 (50% of tuition & 100% of fees)

*Additional course fees and books will be extra.

- Payment options:
 - Students can either pay in full.
 - Students can sign up for a tuition payment plan.
 - Students who receive Free/Reduced Meals will not be responsible for paying fees or tuition, and this can be indicated at the time of registration. CSM will verify this status with the high school.





What is FERPA?

- FERPA is the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, a law enacted in 1974.
- As a college student, your records and your grades are yours alone.
- FERPA mandates that all college academic records may not be shared with third parties, including parents. This applies to Dual Enrollment students, too.
- Students must give written permission for disclosure of grades and other information to third parties.





Program Deadlines

All applications, placement, and Dual Enrollment paperwork/forms must be arranged, completed, and submitted prior to the posted deadlines.
